Participation

A member contacted us to ask two questions...

Is it possible for the AWGB to present a workshop to all our club members on: "How to turn member apathy into member participation".

I don't think this is something we would seriously do as a workshop but I think we could offer constructive advice along the lines of suggesting that the club committee should engage with their members and ask them what they would like to participate in. Perhaps the club committee could construct a short survey or simply ask them. We do exactly that at both the clubs I attend regularly and it seems to work. We also ask our members what subjects they would like to see at demonstrations and we try to find demonstrators who can deliver. This has led to some interesting evenings on what might be thought of as fringe subjects such as forging tools, making walking sticks, pole lathe turning, letter carving, ukulele making etc.

It will be nice if the workshop could address the issue of elderly members predominating to such an extent that members under 50 years old are rare. How do we ensure the long term survival of the club by gaining new and younger members, and particularly female members?

To encourage younger members and more females seems to be an ongoing problem with many clubs but I would suggest advertising in the locality of the club, perhaps in one of the community booklets or newsletters that are sent out in most areas. Another way to reach potential members is for the club to have a stand at local public events. We have picked up a few new members by doing exactly that.

Also a reminder that we offer grants for events so potentially this could be used to fund an event which engaged the public. This brings me nicely on to the next subject.

Event Grants

The trustees have agreed to abolish the rule for event grants that only allows a club to apply in alternate years. Now clubs can apply for event grants every year. Bear in mind that we still have a finite budget and events need to meet our criteria so not all applications may be successful. Hopefully this will enable a few more events to be staged to promote woodturning to the public and perhaps attract a few more members.

Safety at Shows

Having attended one or two shows recently, I was disappointed to see many of the turners without any form of eye/face protection. We have to bear in mind that the people watching might be complete novices who assume that the expert behind the lathe isn't using PPE because it isn't necessary. This isn't the message we want to convey.

Data Protection

Many clubs have contacted us for advice regarding the changes in the data protection act which come into effect on the 25th of May. Because there are so many clubs with differing legal status, different constitutions etc. I don't think it would be wise for us to generalise. Our advice is to visit the Information Commissioners Office website. There is a great deal of information there and a helpline you can call for advice. We have produced a privacy policy which can be found elsewhere in this issue and is also on both our websites. We will be implementing a number of changes around the forms we use and how they are processed. You will encounter those changes when you communicate with us or participate in AWGB programmes.

Demonstrator Training & Tutor Assessments

Both the Demonstrator Training and Tutor Assessment courses continue to receive applications from far and wide.

His teaching allowed him to pass on his knowledge to many students and he will be remembered and missed by everyone who knew him.

News from Italy

Lodovico Grippa



My name is Lodovico Grippa, I'm an Italian woodturner associated to AWGB. I went to Portshead (Bristol) in November 2016 for the AWGB tutor assessment.

Once a month I perform woodturning training courses during a weekend and every Thursday evening I have organized what I call evening woodturning refresher.

Each participant (maximum 5) can subscribe for three sessions and for a very low fee they can spend three hours in the evening taking part in woodturning exercises and practicing in woodturning.

The prerequisite is to have attended at least a course (not necessarily with me as a tutor).

This is one of the initiative that I'm doing, trying to develop

the knowledge of woodturning and trying to attract people to this wonderful art.

In fact in Italy we have a few passionate woodturners, but nothing in comparison with the number of woodturners you have in the UK and there are not many tutors and associations or perhaps they are not very evident and visible.

Something is moving nowadays thanks to the efforts of some institutions and associations that are promoting initiatives on the fantastic world of woodturning. Just to mention some of them without pretending to be exhaustive I can list the ones closest to me for some reasons.

ARCHIVIO SACCHI (the place close to Milan where I carry on my woodturning courses) this is a museum dedicated to a famous modeler who used to make models for several Architects and Designers.

Thankfully, the weather was good to us, so there were plenty of public attending to view and try our lathes, there were three lathes on offer, plus one from West Midlands Club where Malcolm Thorpe and Tom Badger were demonstrating the age old art of Ornamental Turning, using various jigs and fittings to accomplish very interesting shapes and designs. Our very own Fred Lapper was demonstrating on a Jet 1016 lathe also giving instruction when requested. Peter Carless and Stan Bird were demonstrating and also collecting for MacMillan Nurses, to top off these days we had our own Phil Steele using and teaching youngsters on our pole lathe using wood gathered from the park. Unfortunately after a very good day on the Sunday the weather on the Monday was marred by a few brief showers of rain.



Following this weekend we were also at Coventry's Godiva Festival, and again the Banner was put up to let the public see the competence of our organisation, both locally and nationally. This Festival took place on the first weekend in July, closely followed by a summer fair at nearby Newton Paddocks, the home of the Earl and Lady Denby, yet again another day where we were able to show off the sort of articles we can turn for not only enjoyment but also for practical use and for decoration. The banner was also displayed at our own craft festival a two day free event which was held in September.







Seminar Notices

Club Collaboration Competition

At this year's Seminar, the AWGB is introducing a Club Collaboration Competition involving a minimum of five club members to produce a wooden tractor. First prize for the winning team will be $\pounds 250$, second prize will be $\pounds 150$ and third prize will be $\pounds 100$.

- The Collaboration Competition is open to both Affiliated and Associate Clubs and judging will take place at the 2018 International Seminar, to be held at Yarnfield Training and Conference Centre from 5th to 7th October 2018.
- 2. Club teams should comprise of a minimum of 5 Club members and each club may submit one entry.
- The theme for the competition is a Tractor and judging emphasis will be on as many working/moving parts as possible. Battery powered, moving components are NOT permitted.
- 4. The maximum dimensions are 40cms long x 30cms wide x 25cms high
- 5. The tractor must be made solely from wood, which may be any variety.
- Preference in judging will be given to turning techniques as opposed to other disciplines such as carving or pyrography.
- 7. Clubs must submit a materials list with their entry, together with any supplementary plans or techniques that may assist the judges with their decision.
- 8. Judging is 'blind' and therefore any documentation should NOT contain information that will identify the club or individuals.
- However, the AWGB competition co-ordinator WILL require a separate, full list of participants in the collaboration, together with photographs of the participants and of the entry, during production.
- 10. The judge's decision is final.



This wonderful model tractor and trailer was made in 2010. It was a collaborative effort by a large number of club members, who each produced at least one of the many parts involved. The East Surrey Woodturners presented this model tractor to the Royal Marsden Hospital on 10th January 2011, to be used to raise money for the hospital. The tractor is about 40cm long and is comprised of about 100 separate turned pieces using 8 different types of timber (and some string!).

Data Controller:

The AWGB is the data controller. We are a company limited by guarantee (company number 8135399 and AWGB Trading Ltd 8425064) and a registered charity (Charity number 1105255).

Lawful basis for processing:

We need to collect your contact information in order to maintain a list of members; contacts for clubs; contacts for members offering services; to run courses, seminars and other events.

We will obtain your consent to allow us to administer the association.

How we use the information we collect: AWGB members:

- We use your contact information to communicate with you regarding your membership. We ask for names, addresses, phone numbers and email addresses and may use any method available to us to contact you. (phone numbers and email addresses are not mandatory but they help us to keep you informed).
- We use a third party mailing company to send you the quarterly "Revolutions" newsletter.
- We compile a report for HMRC to enable us to claim gift aid from those members who have agreed this and we maintain archive records to comply with tax legislation.
- We pass members contact details on to training providers for those who have booked courses.
- Photographs taken at events may be published on the web or in the "Revolutions" newsletter.
- We pass names of seminar delegates on to the accommodation providers to enable them to reserve rooms for us. If delegates have special access or dietary requirements, we also pass those details on to the accommodation providers.

Club officials and individuals under special circumstances:

The following people will be asked for consent before their information or image is published on the website or in the "Revolutions" newsletter.

- · Club officers.
- Those offering services through our skills register.
- Under 18s featured in a photograph and their parents/guardians.

Website users:

- We may use cookies to facilitate services we offer on our websites. Cookies are small data files stored on your computer. These are used to improve the way the website is presented to you.
- We store contact details for those who make purchases on the websites or for those who contact us so we can process the order or contact the individual.
- We use web tracking technology which uses anonymised data to produce reports on website performance.
- Log files are stored with website activity which may contain IP addresses.
- Online payment processing is carried out by a third party service provider. The service provider uses the information they collect to process your payment and inform us the payment has been made. Records of financial transactions are kept by the payment processor.

Email Newsletter subscribers:

- We use names and email addresses to send out periodic email bulletins.
- Some email bulletins may also contain tracking technology to enable reports on which links were clicked and how many people opened the email.

Sharing data:

- We don't sell information to any other organisation.

Data Retention:

- You have a right to request rectification of incorrect data we hold about you.
- You have the right to opt out of communications other than membership renewals.
- You have a right to have your data erased if it is no longer necessary for us to retain it.
- Where there is a dispute as to the accuracy of your data, you can request a restriction is placed on any further processing.
- If you are unhappy with the way the AWGB has dealt with your complaint, you can lodge a complaint with the Information Commissioner's Office. Their address is below.








Microcrystalline Wax.

A grand day out!


The AWGB run some really good workshops for those of us afflicted with turning, I was lucky enough to be selected to attend one such event and this is how we got on!

The workshop was the Corinthian Helmet making course held at the workshop of Andrew Hall in County Durham, the course was attended by four AWGB members from the North East and Scotland. We were joined in the workshop for the day by Allan Joicey whose advice and support are always on hand and whose questions always seem to lead you to the correct solutions!

We started the day with introductions and the required Health and Safety notices followed by Andrew explaining the basic outline of the day with sketches and examples of the stages of making the small size Helmets.







Once the formalities were out of the way we were let loose onto a pile of green Ash blanks which had been prepared by cutting them into spindle blanks (grain parallel to the lathes axis of rotation) which were around 100mm square and around 170mm long. The initial task was to turn the blank down to the largest possible cylinder and put a chucking point onto both ends.

Once in the chuck the length was set and the "spare" cut off complete with its chucking point to give a handy little jam chuck either for this project or for any other that might require it.

The process is then pretty much the same as making a goblet with a short stem, shaping the outside first to give the outside shape of the helmet and then removing the inside.

Derek Phillips

I first met Derek in 1989 at the Ely Guild of Woodturners and found him a fount of knowledge when it came to woodturning. He ran the beginners lessons before the actual branch meetings. I know that the majority of novices were turned into very good woodturners. and many went on to win prizes at the club competitions.

Derek had a dry sense of humour and would not spend money where it was not needed. He use to joke that instead of buying abrasives he would collect sand from Hunstanton beach and stick it to paper. He called it 30 grit, his finishing was however first class. He was the first woodturner I came across who always looked at the bottom finish of a piece of work 'Always look at the bottom, if its not finished underneath its not worthy of comment'. That is something that stuck with me ever since.

He left the Ely Guild to set up Cambridge Woodturners around 2000 and was a valued member. He also demonstrated at Peter Childs workshop every 2 weeks and was always coming up with new items to demonstrate. He retired to the West of England and enjoyed the life in around the Devon/Cornwall border.

Its a sad loss to the Woodturning fraternity.

RIP Derek I am sure your catching up with some old woodturning mates like John Ambrose and Ray Hopper.

The helmet is in fact an upside down goblet and the stem is trimmed down to form a small spigot, of which more later...

The big advantage of the workshop day is that not only do you get the benefit of the two professional and experienced turners but you also have your fellow addicts to share experience and handy tips. A range of tools were used in the hollowing because with the array available to us it would have been rude not to try at least a few....well that was my excuse.

The thickness of the walls were measured using a set of scissor calipers and whilst turning a small LED light proved to be very useful in gauging the wall thickness - this works really well on the side walls of this project as you are working in spindle blank orientation and the side walls don't have alternating side and end grain as they do in a bowl blank.

A small spigot had to be left on the completed goblet bowl to give an attachment point for the crest on the helmet and of course one person could not resist the opportunity test the









tutor by telling him their goblet bowl had been parted off with no spigot left at all....sadly nobody got a photo of Andrew's face at that point!

A splendid lunch was provided by Janet and the conversation of course mostly focused on tools and lathes, its funny how that always seems to happen in a room full of woodturners.

The next stage was to use a template to mark the cut away sections of the helmet and then to cut them away using a Proxxon mini jig saw, this is trickier than it looks as the helmet does not have a flat surface and the thin walls mean that vibration is a major issue. All of the helmets were cut without major issues and the cut out pieces were saved to be used as templates in our own workshops for future helmet projects.



The next turning task was to turn a piece which would be machined on the bandsaw to make a "crest" for the helmet, this is basically a thin disc with a cove on its edge and some other basic details. The piece is then cut down on the



bandsaw and the "spare" piece is saved to be used as a marking up template for future projects of this type. A hole is drilled in the crest and it is then fitted to the "spigot" on top





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of the helmet and the project is then ready to have any final "tweaks" made, sand and finish in whatever way you see fit.

Overall a good project and a grand day out, next time you see a workshop listed I would recommend you get in touch and get yourself along to one, you never know you might just have some fun!

Minutes of the AGM of the AWGB

held on Sunday 22nd April 2018 at Little Yeldham Village Hall

Present: Paul Hannaby (PH) Chairman, Jeff Belcher (JB), Derek Puplett (DP), Mike Wilson (MW), Sheila Hughes (SH), Mark Hogan (MH), Pat Murphy (PM), Howard Hughes (HH), Colin Smith (CS), John Montgomery (JM), Paul Middleton (PMi), plus 33 Branch members.

The Chairman welcomed everyone and opened the meeting.

Apologies received from Russell Gibbs (RG), Roger Cutler (RG), Peter Bradwick (PB), David Wilcox (DW) and Peter Taylor

Minutes of last year's AGM were tabled for approval and a typographic error was pointed put. It was corrected and the Chairman signed the minutes.

There were no matters arising from the previous minutes.

Treasurers Report

The Treasurer explained the relationship between the AWGB Charity and the AWGB Trading Company as far as the accounts are concerned.

He stated that the charity is in a financially sound position with a fund balance of over £85K

The Trading Company has a Trading Deficit of £14.6K

If anyone requires a full set of accounts, please contact the Treasurer on treasurer@awgb.co.uk.

Looking at a couple of specific items, the income of £74,800 for the Charity is quite normal, but the expenditure had risen last year from £65K to £85K. This was due to more money being spent on training, the 30 'Birthday Bash' events and an additional payment made for underpayment for the production of Revolutions Magazine.

The Charity, at the end of the year, had £80K cash in hand at the bank.

It had debtors of £21K, mainly due to loans made to Trading Company for previous seminars. Currently, the Trading Company has insufficient funds to pay the charity, but it is hopeful that after this year's seminar, some of the debt will be repaid.

There were no further questions on the Charity accounts.

Looking at the Trading Company:

It made a loss of £1306, which was due to items which have to be paid such as Accountants fees, insurance etc., regardless of whether it's a seminar year or not.

Balance Sheet shows £18.6K in the bank with £33K of creditors, made up from money owed to Charity and Seminar sales made in 2017.

At the end of 2017, the Trading Company had Net Liabilities of £14.6K

A question was asked from the floor as to whether there were any restrictions on the time when the loans from the Charity had to be paid back. The Treasurer replied that there were no restrictions.

There were no further questions on the Trading Company accounts.

Acceptance of both sets of accounts was proposed by Barry Tucker-Vincent and seconded by David Godfrey.

A brief overview of this year's Seminar was given by Mark Hogan in which he indicated that we have just over 180 delegates already booked with over 5 months still to go. We already have more delegates than attended the last seminar.

Chairman's report

Firstly, I'd like to welcome you all to Little Yeldham. Thanks to the SECB branch for allowing us to use their club venue for the AGM.

The last 12 months have been a period of significant change for the Association. Mike Glover resigned as secretary and was replaced with Derek Puplett who was co-opted as a trustee. Dave Atkinson stepped down as chairman at the end of 2017 and Sam Webber also stepped down as vicechairman at the same time. I would like to record my personal thanks to Dave who has served the AWGB for over ten years and Sam who has served for around six years. The trustees voted me in as chairman and Russell Gibbs, who can't be with us today, as vice-chairman. I would like to thank my fellow trustees for their vote of confidence. I hope I can justify their decision! Paul Middleton was co-opted as a trustee to replace me in the role of webmaster and data manager and Roger Cutler, who can't be with us today, was also co-opted as a trustee to replace Russell as trade liaison officer. Thank you to Derek, Paul and Roger for giving up their free time to become trustees. I'm sure we have a great team who can continue the good work of evolving the AWGB.

As usual it's been a busy 12 months since our last AGM and I must thank all my fellow Trustees for their hard work and diligence throughout the year.

The last twelve months have been very busy with:

- Training ongoing delivery of workshops, Youth Training and the new courses part funded by WCT for the Certificate in Woodturning. Our demonstrator training continues to prove popular as does the AWGB tutor badge
- Attendance at a range of shows at our usual wood related venues plus other county shows and major craft events – a huge thank you to all those who manned the stands and made our attendance possible.
- Making arrangements for the 2018 Seminar including finalising the arrangements at Yarnfield, organising the demonstrators and the programme and getting off the ground with the delegate bookings. Thanks to Mark Hogan for dealing with the complications and individual requirements. We have confirmed the charity will donate £6,000 to the Seminar. In terms of a training event, this offers very good value for money for the charity.

- Awarding thirty-seven Birthday Bash Grants of £300 each.
- Awarding grants from the Roger and Nina Stewart Fund plus our usual demonstrator and event grants. We have also received another donation of £7500 from the Roger and Nina Stewart fund. Thanks to Robert Craig for considering us.
- Demonstrator grants for branches have increased to £300 from last January.
- The online Revolutions archive was completed at the end of 2017.

Going forward we will be:

- Continuing our work on seminar promotion and general arrangements. Booking numbers already have exceeded the last Seminar so our publicity campaign is paying off. Hopefully this will secure the future of the Seminar. More details from Mark shortly... We will be judging the new club collaboration competition at the Seminar and we hope there will be lots of tractors on display.
- o Continuing with awarding demonstrator and event grants.
- Continuing with awarding grants under the Roger and Nina Stewart banner and from our general grant fund.
- Continuing with attendance at shows
- Continuing with the e-bulletins which now has over 2100 subscribers.
- We will continue to offer training workshops and we are aiming to increase the number of courses on offer. It would be useful if members let us know what courses they would like to do so we can tailor our offerings accordingly.
- It is also a long term goal of mine to increase the number of individual members. You can help with this by spreading the word, increasing awareness at public events and perhaps even suggesting ways for increasing member retention.

It remains for me to thank all our members for their continued support and to thank you for attending today.

The Secretary announced that the Regional Representative for the South West, John Montgomery and the regional Representative for Scotland, David Wilcox were both nominated by their respective regions and will be Trustees of the Charity for the next 2 years.

Pat Murphy and Howard Hughes were co-opted Regional Representatives for the Midlands and Northern areas respectively. They will also be Trustees for the next two years.

Colin Smith was nominated by Barry Tucker-Vincent and seconded by Dennis Day to be South East Regional Representative and Trustee for two years.

Paul Hannaby (Chairman), Russell Gibbs (Vice Chairman), Derek Puplett (Secretary), Mike Wilson (Membership Secretary), Mark Hogan (Seminar Bookings), Peter Bradwick Development and Training Officer) Paul Middleton (Webmaster and Database Manager) and Roger Cutler (Trade and Business Liaison Officer) will all commence a four year term as Trustees.

It was proposed by Mike Favager that Harold Wilson Chartered Accountants be used as Auditors for the coming financial year. This was seconded by Barry Tucker-Vincent.



Treasurer's Report – Fy 2017

The Treasurer stated that the accounts had been examined by our accountants and approved by the Trustees.

In case anyone was not aware of the split of the accounts between the Trading and Charity aspects of the Association the treasurer gave a brief explanation.

As an organisation the AWGB is in a sound financial state with the value of the accounts at audit standing at:

Charity	£85,415
Trading	-£14,619

The various aspects of the accounts were largely consistent year on year with some exceptions explained below.

Charity Account as at 31/12/17

Notes on The Charity Account:

- The overall "value" of the Charity has come down from £96K to £85.5K due in the most part to the additional expenditure approved for "Birthday Bash" events organised by Clubs and Branches to celebrate the 30th anniversary of the AWGB in 2017.
- At 31 December 2017 the Charity had £80K in Cash at the Bank with debtors of £21.5K (mainly an outstanding loan made to the Trading Account for the last Seminars). It also had creditors of £16.5K (mainly 2018 membership subscriptions paid during 2017).
- 3. Increases in expenditure on the Association's main charitable activities in 2017 were:

Birthday Bash Grants	£10,800
Training	£7,300
Revolutions	£2,700

Total £20,800

4. Of note is the £2,700 increase in expenditure on the costs of Revolutions which was not due to increases in costs but was due to incorrect billing for some 2016 costs which were not corrected and paid until 2017.

Trading Account as at 31/12/2017:

- 1. The Trading account shows an overall loss on activities for the year of £1,306.
- 2. 2017 was a non Seminar year and the fixed costs of running the Trading account covering accountancy, insurance, software and bank charges etc. can only be offset by sales of our promotional goods which are generally very small in comparison with these costs. It is anticipated that the success of this year's Seminar will offset these costs.
- 3. The Trading Account has net liabilities of £14.5K with a cash at bank balance of £18.5K and has the following Creditors as at 31 December 2017:

Creditors:

Taxation (VAT) etc.	£1,852
AWGB Loan (from previous Seminars)	£21,472
Delegates Fees already paid for 2018	£9,908

Total Creditors £33,232

Accounting Software

One other thing which has happened this last year is that we have had to move to an online version of the Quickbooks accounting package we use. The online version of Quickbooks will cost us more as we now have to pay a monthly fee rather than a one off cost to purchase a stand alone copy of the software.

This move was not without difficulties but it the on line version is now operational and provides the ability to enable more than one person to work on the accounts should the need arise e.g. during a Seminar year.

The increased ongoing costs are:

- a. Charity 12 * £9 pcm for 2 years £108 pa
- b. Trading 12*£7.50 pcm for 2 years £90 pa
- c. Thereafter the costs will double.

Overall Assessment of the Associations Finances for 2017

As an Association:

- 1. We are, currently, financially sound and have sufficient funds to promote our craft, support our members in a variety of ways and to run the Association.
- We significantly increased expenditure in 2017 on promoting our craft via the Birthday Bash Grant and the increased expenditure on Training.

Miscellaneous Items

Acceptance of the accounts was proposed and approved.

It was proposed and approved that Howard Wilson Associates should continue to be our Accountants for 2018.

Cambridge Woodturner's AWGB 30th Birthday Celebration

Belated thanks go to the AWGB from Cambridge Woodturners for the generous 30th Birthday Bash grant awarded to the club last year.

Soon after receiving the funds the committee began planning a special event to celebrate the occasion at the group's usual meeting place, the Cambridge Scout headquarters. Our plan was to fill the hall with people and we were delighted when Mark Sanger agreed to come up from Dorset to give us an all-day demonstration on Saturday 21st October for his first visit to the club. As an added attraction, Nigel Fleckney would also be there with a fine selection of his English hardwoods for sale. Posters advertising the event were delivered or emailed to other woodturning clubs in the surrounding area to encourage as many of their members as possible to visit and share the day. A few months later an advert was placed in Revolutions. Needless to say we were very pleased with the result as we received 18 bookings from eight other clubs - Bury St. Edmunds, Chelmer Valley, Colchester, Ely Guild, Herts & Beds, Norwich, West Suffolk and Jorvick Woodturning Group (York) – as well as from plenty of our own members.



The committee set up the kitchen and hall on the Friday to give us enough time to welcome our members, visitors and guests on the Saturday morning.

Mark opened his demonstration by explaining what he was going to cover for us and at several points during the day emphasised the importance of taking health and safety precautions. The morning session included turning an end grain bowl and then a wavy edge cross grain bowl which he decorated with his pyrography equipment. This was followed by some turning of boxes and colouring and texturing them. Mark gave out a lot of tips and ideas for us all to take on board to help and improve our own turning. After the break for lunch, his demonstration was of a two-part hollow form



made from a Sycamore log. He explained that he prefers to use English hardwoods on which he can most effectively apply colour and other forms of decoration. At the end of this action packed full day demonstration, Mark was thanked and warmly applauded by all those present. We hope to see him again in the future to show us some more of his techniques, skills and artistry.

Thanks to the AWGB grant, a delicious and plentiful savoury platter lunch as well as tea/coffee breaks all served in the hall was included at a much reduced ticket price. This helped make a special occasion more enjoyable for a full house with not an empty chair in sight.

It was most encouraging that so many of the members, not least those from the other clubs, told us how much they had enjoyed the day.



Principles

The purpose of this document is to clarify the policy of the use of dust protection equipment when using a woodturning lathe.

Terms

The use of the term RPE in this document refers to Respiratory Protective Equipment.

Organisation

To help promote a healthy and safe attitude when working on the lathe, be it at a professional or hobby level, the AWGB has adopted guidance from the HSE as a minimum level. It is a crucial element in the promotion and maintenance of a positive health and safety culture and in achieving high standards of health and safety awareness at all levels throughout the Association. Any subsequent revisions of this policy will be brought to the notice of our members.

Responsibility

It is the responsibility of each individual member to work safely and reduce the risk of injury caused through lathe operation. It is also the responsibility for those members that are concerned about unsafe practices at demonstrations and teaching practices to raise these concerns as soon as possible with the person practising or the relevant supervisor.

It is also the responsibility of event organisers and demonstrators to protect audience members from harm.

Health and Safety is everyone's responsibility.

Levels of protection

It is assumed that most turners will use either disposable masks or self-contained respirators so the comparison is limited to those. Details on other types of RPE are available in the HSE documents referred to at the end of this document.

Half mask respirators: These are intended for continuous use for periods of less than one hour. Masks marked "NR" (not reusable) should be disposed of at the end of the day. Reusable masks are marked "R". Masks with replaceable filters should have their filters replaced according to the manufacturer's instructions.

Powered respirators with hoods/helmets: These can be used for periods of more than one hour. Filters should be replaced according to the manufacturer's instructions.

Protection factors

Respirators		Protection	Percentage of
Half Mask Powered		Factor	dust trapped
FFP1	-	4	75%
FFP2	TH1	10	90%
FFP3	TH2	20	95%
-	TH3	40	98%

For wood dust, a protection factor of 20 is recommended.

Respirators designed for dust protection may not be effective against fumes from paints, finishes and solvents etc. Generally speaking, dust filters offer no protection against gas/vapours, and gas/vapour filters offer no protection against dust. Ensure appropriate protective equipment is used for each application. It may be possible to use a respirator that will have separate filters which are effective against both dust and gas/vapour.

Any RPE will only be effective if it is made to the right standard; is in good condition and is properly fitted.

Policy

All wood dust is hazardous to health.

RPE to be worn during any activity that generates dust, either on or off the lathe.

RPE will be worn when cleaning filters or changing dust collection bags on workshop dust extraction or filtration equipment.

RPE must have the protection factor and must be CE marked. Always use equipment which has at least the recommended protection factor.

Removal of dust at source is considered good practice. Extractors which take away most of the dust at the point of creation help reduce the amount of dust in the air but bear in mind that some filter bags on extractors are not designed to filter out small dust particles so they may reduce the amount of visible dust but may not remove the harmful small airborne particles.

Ambient air filtration is also considered good practice to reduce the amount of airborne dust by filtering the air in the workshop.

When cleaning the workshop, RPE should continue to be worn. Avoid blowing dust because this just puts it back into the air where it can do you harm. Use a vacuum cleaner to remove dust.

All demonstrators and tutors must emphasise the use of protective equipment.

Care and maintenance

Disposable dust masks and respirator filters should be replaced according to the manufacturer's instructions.

Dust extraction/filtration equipment should be maintained according to the manufacturer's instructions
