AWGB Member Training Workshops - The Dilemma

AWGB Member Training Workshops are hosted by passionate professional turners, in good facilities, with all materials being provided. The training is informal, informative and constructive, you leave a better turner than when you arrived with a project piece you can be proud of and they are free! So what is The Dilemma?

Well I was interested in improving my turning skills and I noticed a Training Workshop was planned in my local area. By coincidence the workshop was being hosted by Andrew Hall (aka Hat Man) who is entirely to blame for my garage being knee deep in wood shavings most of the time. (Andrew is to blame because he inspired me to take up woodturning after I attended one of his demonstrations). My dilemma was simply that with less than 2 years sporadic woodturning experience was I an appropriate candidate to attend an Intermediate Training Workshop? Yes, I had turned a few bowls, made a decent fist of a box, a live edged bowl and even managed an involuted (inside out) turned piece but my coves and bevels definitely need improvement, I still have more than my fair share of catches and/or forced design

changes and my latest attempt to produce a goblet is now carefully stored in the scrap box. So to put it bluntly am I good enough? Would I succeed in completing the project or would I embarrass myself and spoil the day for the others? Also as a member of a very active woodturning club (Crow Valley Turners) I already had a ready supply of passionate woodturners to help me improve my skills, so why apply to join a workshop which is probably oversubscribed anyway?

Well having just attended the workshop and now being the proud owner of a Corinthian Helmet I clearly resolved the dilemma. I completed the straightforward application form and the workshop was surprisingly not oversubscribed (knowing what I now know I have no idea why not!). So I found myself joining 4 other turners for a very enjoyable day. It turned out most of the others had shared my dilemma and there was indeed various levels of experience and skills on display. However, no one stood out as much better or worse than the others, everyone completed the project and we all received coaching which improved our techniques. Personally I benefitted from various suggestions such as adjusting the position of my thumb on the gouge which improved my cuts and produced that elusive continuous stream of fine shavings. I got to try a number of Andrew's tools (deciding to add some and remove others from my Christmas wish list!) and I picked up a number of tips such as friction fitting a dowel rather than repeated remounting of the spindle to make small adjustments. In summary I benefitted from the workshop and definitely left a better turner than when I arrived.

So for me The Dilemma is resolved. If you are wondering if you are good enough to join a Members Training Workshop you almost certainly are. If want to know if you will benefit from a workshop you definitely will. If you want to spend a very enjoyable day with like minded turners seeking to improve their skills then there is no better way than to apply for an AWGB Members Training Workshop.

Woodturners make the bullets

Most people would be forgiven for thinking that shells fired at aircraft during WW2 were small bullets possibly around 9 or 12 inches long. However, when the local aviation heritage museum came calling on the Lincolnshire Wolds Woodturning Association based at West Ashby, near Horncastle, members gained a new insight to wartime munitions.

The Lincolnshire Aviation Heritage Centre at East Kirkby, near Spilsby, Lincs, is the home of one of the three Lancaster bombers to have survived WW2. Whilst Lancaster 'Just Jane' can't take to the skies yet, she is busy most weekends taking passengers on taxi runs on the airfield preserved by the Panton family. Designed to be a memorial to one of the Panton brothers who did not return from a wartime mission, brothers Fred and Harold have established a base which is visited by hundreds of visitors each day of the year.

The centre had been loaned an ack-ack shell from another museum and wanting a replica for their displays. The shells are in fact a metre long and almost 90mm diameter, with the explosive bit almost half the length. With the fuse adjusted via a screw in the projectile nose to set the height at which it would explode, these shells would be fired at a rate of five to eight a minute at the bombers as they approached their target. When the explosion occurred, the air would be filled with thousands of pieces of shrapnel which would cut into engines, fuel tanks, the airframe or the crews themselves and resulted in hundreds of Lancaster

Bombers being brought down before or after they had released their bombs.

Family member Mr Phillip Panton, nephew of the Lancaster pilot approached the Woodturning Club to ask if a replica could be made in wood. Two of these replicas were presented at a special visit to the centre after a Club member Mr John Liles had copied the original.

The wooden blanks had been provided by local bespoke carpenters, Turners of Horncastle, made in Idigbo timber which is an African hardwood. With John Liles, in his 80's, being one of the few members who had a lathe big enough and having been turning for a life time, regularly seen at the club advising fellow members, he was the easy choice to be given the task.

Phillip had painted one of the replica wooden shells to match how the original would have looked, which in this case was yellow to indicate high explosive, but there were also red ones which were armour piercing. Brass colour finished the job to simulate the brass casing for the charge giving the projectile the ability to reach planes at around 25,000 feet above the target.





Club Collaboration Competition

At this year's Seminar, the AWGB is introducing a Club Collaboration Competition involving a minimum of five club members to produce a wooden tractor. First prize for the winning team will be $\pounds 250$, second prize will be $\pounds 150$ and third prize will be $\pounds 100$.

- The Collaboration Competition is open to both Affiliated and Associate Clubs and judging will take place at the 2018 International Seminar, to be held at Yarnfield Training and Conference Centre from 5th to 7th October 2018.
- 2. Club teams should comprise of a minimum of 5 Club members and each club may submit one entry.
- The theme for the competition is a Tractor and judging emphasis will be on as many working/moving parts as possible. Battery powered, moving components are NOT permitted.
- 4. The maximum dimensions are 40cms long x 30cms wide x 25cms high
- 5. The tractor must be made solely from wood, which may be any variety.
- Preference in judging will be given to turning techniques as opposed to other disciplines such as carving or pyrography.
- 7. Clubs must submit a materials list with their entry, together with any supplementary plans or techniques that may assist the judges with their decision.
- 8. Judging is 'blind' and therefore any documentation should NOT contain information that will identify the club or individuals.
- However, the AWGB competition co-ordinator WILL require a separate, full list of participants in the collaboration, together with photographs of the participants and of the entry, during production.
- 10. The judge's decision is final.



This wonderful model tractor and trailer was made in 2010. It was a collaborative effort by a large number of club members, who each produced at least one of the many parts involved. The East Surrey Woodturners presented this model tractor to the Royal Marsden Hospital on 10th January 2011, to be used to raise money for the hospital. Les Thorne Spindle Techniques

As a complete beginner to the delights and frustrations of woodturning, I was fortunate enough to be selected to join three other keen AWGB members to attend a day of spindle and bowl turning techniques with Les Thorne.

We all arrived promptly per the instructions Les sent prior to the event and we were greeted by a very warm welcome from Les. We introduced ourselves and shared our woodturning experiences over a coffee with Les who outlined the schedule of the day.

Les shared simple 'house safety rules' that any of us would have in our own workshops, allowing you to take responsibility for your work and safety, though he does keep a keen eye and ear open for anything not completely safe and makes it known through his easy-going manner.

Les started the session by assigning us a lathe each with all the necessary equipment pre-prepared, including pine spindle blanks and an Ash bowl blank pre-drilled for screw chuck mounting.

The session was back to basics on spindle turning starting with principles of bevel contact. Les demonstrated this perfectly with a gouge and the spindle stationary, showing that the bevel rubbing correctly will burnish the wood and a fully controlled cut only needs the bevel in contact with the wood and then lifting the handle further increases the severity of the cut, which for me as a complete beginner, I found all this to be the best explanation yet.

On to using the spindle roughing gouge and the importance of supporting the cut. Here Les explained how the tool rest must be underneath the cut otherwise the tool rolls over and the wing digs in. He also explaining why and how the spindle roughing gouge cannot be used on end-grain (bowl) turning.

Les insisted on more work, less talk so we were straight onto the lathes to bring a square blank to a round. "Speed is your friend", says Les as he described how lathe speed relates to work diameter and how it helps also with the finish straight off the tool that means less sanding – bonus!

Most important to spindle turning was the body movement, shown as anchoring the tool into the hip and moving between your feet across the spindle. This took some practice, but when it clicked we could see the benefit in bringing the spindle to parallel but also the speed in roughing in both directions. Also, our beads and coves showed improvement when we used our body movement.

I think we all overcame 'skew fear' following Les' tuition on the principles of the planning skew and managed to confidently plane our spindles both right- and left-handed, though we hadn't the time to master the "skewdriver" that Les professionally demonstrated! As a result, I recently used my skew to turn down a piece of oak into a 9" table lamp spindle – thanks Les.

We were set to work turning down squares to round and practicing our beads and coves, albeit some were more triangular than rounded. Nonetheless, Les was pleased to see progress from where we had all started and insisted that "spindle turners can turn anything", so that's what I'll be practicing.

After our lunch and a load of banter from Les, we put our new spindle techniques to the test on the Ash bowl. Mounting it on the screw chuck, Les had us turn a tenon and shape the outside using push cut and pull cut techniques.

It was clear to see all we'd learnt from the spindle being applied to the bowl: body movement, supported cut, and bevel contact all made sense. Les explained the theory of cutting from small to large diameter on the outside and large to small diameter on the inside of a bowl, and safe method of hand-sanding and power-sanding.

During the day, Les demonstrated tool sharpening; setting up the bevel, the grinding action for each tool and recognising when the edge was sharp. Les could have spent a whole day on tool grinding judging by his obvious experience on this topic.

Les makes you feel completely at ease in his 'shop and made the day most enjoyable with his banter and keen wit. It is clearly obvious that Les enjoys teaching and has huge patience with turners of any experience. We'd very much like to return for another session with Les and highly recommend you visit the Old Dairy for a day with Les Thorne.

AWGB Supports Hands-on Woodturning for Young People

As part of the Club's programme of introducing young people to woodturning, over half a dozen members of East Herts, Cambridge and Middlesex woodturners together with an Orchard Woodturner spent a very hot Friday in an empty marquee converting it to a hands-on woodturning venue. They set up a screened area with multiple lathes, and a display table in the public area. They also set up Pyrography hands-on and demonstration lathes.

On a very hot day, and in competition with a football match in Russia, 35 turners and helpers from East Hertfordshire Woodturning Association, the Cambridge Woodturners, Oxford Woodturners, Garden of England woodturning club, Middlesex Woodturners Association and Orchard Woodturners (an independent club from Kent), plus professional support from Ed Oliver, attended Gilwell 24 at

Gilwell Park, Chingford, North East London. At this they enabled over 100 young people to experience hands-on woodturning and countless young people to do Pyrography, a new opportunity which Orchard Woodturners offered this year. The woodturning operation was similar to the previous 8 years it has been organised by the East Herts Club, with the young people being given a short safety briefing before making something simple in about half an hour on a lathe under the supervision from an experienced turner.

To date, over 3500 young people have experienced handson woodturning at events organised by the East Hertfordshire Woodturning Association.

This year a number of experienced turners, who had not been to Gilwell 24 before, supervised a lathe. This followed a training day held, earlier in the year by East Herts turners with support from Paul Howard and funded by the Worshipful Company of Turners. We were particularly pleased to welcome the Master and Mistress Turner from the Company and the Chairman of the Company's Howe Committee to the event.

In addition to East Herts Club lathes, Axminster Power Tools and Machinery loaned half a dozen for the event.

Gilwell 24 is a 24 hour activity day (from 9am on the Saturday until 9am on the Sunday), for about 5000 Explorer Scouts and Senior Section Guides and is held annually. For safety reasons the hands-on woodturning ran from 9am to 7pm. The available hands-on woodturning sessions were fully booked by the young people by 10.30 in the morning and about 100 young people plus many leaders could not be accommodated.

Turned items were also displayed in the open area and two excellent turners enabled those young people and leaders not able to have a chance to have a go at hands-on woodturning, to see the craft being demonstrated.

These events can only take place with the generous support of many people and organisations. The East Hertfordshire Woodturning Association acknowledges the support of the AWGB, The Worshipful Company of Turners, Axminster



Power Tools and Machinery, Chestnut Products, Henry Taylor Tools, Ed Oliver, Colin Smith (the South East Area Rep for AWGB), and all the members of the various clubs who assisted so well in the heat.

It was very satisfying to see woodturning was again very popular despite the other distractions.

About a year ago, one of our members, who is profoundly deaf, was running a stall at a wood fair, and was asked if she could pass on a request to the Bury St Edmunds Woodturning Club to make some finials for the Abbey Gardens, a central park and tourist attraction. We invited the head gardener to come to the club to discuss it and to gauge the level of support for the project. Well he came to the club and explained that the gardens had 44 posts, which were 6"by 6" or 150 mm by 150mm depending on which side of the rule you measured them with.


The plan was to have various chess pieces on top of each post, and he came to my house and we turned one to represent a pawn.

We heard no more for months after that, but then I had an email from Rebecca Davis asking if we were still interested. Rebecca is the local council horticulture officer, and was keen to take up the idea; this was for the 'Bury in Bloom' competition, in which Bury has had some success in the past.

We invited Rebecca and she explained just what was wanted, which was a finial from the 6" by 6" oak post to sit on top of the existing posts. We agreed to a 3" by 1" hole for a dowel to fix the finial.

The wood was in another local park, and the rangers there agreed to cut the posts to length, and I went to collect them. This was in the spring and it had been wet, very wet, the wood was green and weighed a ton. I brought it home in two trips and stacked them in the lean to.

The design had been altered by then, the 'Monuments people' had decreed on the one and only acceptable design, which was this one.





The response from the members was great, we had almost enough volunteers to complete the task, so I emailed the picture and cut a few templates for people to work to.

The members fell on them when I took them to the club; I was left with the blanks I could not get in the car!

Between us we made 45 blanks, and 45 dowels and I returned them to the local park for the gardeners to fit. One member turned ten, whilst another turned just the one, and between us we finished the job.

Turning one of these was an experience! I started by cutting of the corners to make roughing down easier, and then roughed down to a cylinder, the wood was so wet puddles

A group of woodturners from Bury St Edmunds have produced 44 oak finials for the new posts in the town's beautiful Abbey Gardens.

Club members volunteered to make the finials and they have now been installed on the posts, and new and existing climbing roses will be trained to grow up the posts and along the true which run in between.

One final note, a member of the public saw the finials and as he was downsizing he gave to me two pieces of pitch pine taken from a very old church pew as he was so impressed with the finials. We will have a free raffle next club night, just for the twelve members who made these finials.


