Preceded at 10:00 by a meeting of members and Branch Representatives chaired by myself.

It was only in the last issue of Revolutions that I wrote that we had been re-joined on the Executive by our ex-Chairman Dave Atkinson who volunteered his extensive knowledge to be our Vice Chairman, It is with great sadness that I have to report that due to reoccurring health problems he has had to resign his post but has promised to help us in any way that is possible. prices (including the Early Bird price). We hope that you approve of our choices and make the effort to attend, there is much work to be undertaken before the event but I feel sure that the Executice are up to it.

So far this year we are giving financial support to some 7 members over two instances of the Certificate in Woodturning courses organised by The Worshipful Company of Turners (WCT).

Requests for grants have crept up on us and we have a meeting arranged in the near future to adjudicate these

We are still looking for a Regional Representative for the South East, these are not difficult jobs and can be very rewarding, speak to any of the Executive if you think that you could help out.

Our programme of Member Training Workshops continues to thrive with, as I write, ten events advertised on the website https://www.awgb.co.uk/training/training-workshop-dates/.

There are also 3 Youth training events advertised, https://www.awgb.co.uk/training/youth-training/, don't forget membership of the AWGB for under 21's is free.

Instructor training to gain the coveted AWGB Tutor Badge continues to be popular with many apace with 20 being awarded to date this year with for a further 15 members set to undertake the assessment shortly. We believe that this award should be attempted by all those tutoring in clubs and at home with friends to ensure that a comparable level of training can be given across the craft.

The updated Demonstrator training courses were due to be trialled but are at the moment on hold due to ill health in the development team, members on the waiting list are being kept informed we hope to recommence this course very soon.

I had a good meeting with the Master of the WCT at Newark Woodworking Show, he is interested in reviewing the Youth Training, I informed him that we had commenced a review with Dave Atkinson and Peter Bradwick, we agreed to have a combined meeting to discuss.

I will remind you again that 19th October 2023, a date for your diary, the Worshipful Company will be running their Competitions at Pewterers' Hall, London some of which are of course open to AWGB members, this is a great opportunity to not only win prizes but to also offer your works for sale at a prestigious event. Prizes will be presented at the end of the public opening on 19th October 2023.

Finally, as always, we are on the look out for people to assist with the running of the Association and in particular we are looking for someone with Social Media skills (Facebook, Twitter, Instagram) to spread the word to both members and non-members. # Treasurers report 30th April 2023

In my opinion the most informative document for the members of the association is the one that has been distributed and will appear in this is of Revolutions. It endeavours to show the state of the charity's reserves together with the financial activities of the year. The emphasis is on the benefit that the charity brings to its members compared to the costs of its administration. The comparative figures for 2021 are included although that year did not include the costs of the seminar but did suffer the effects of the Covid Pandemic.

The overall benefit to members in the form of grants, insurance, training, Revolutions and the running of the seminar amount to £70,000 against administration of £16,000. As our income has only been £74,000 there has had to have been some diminution in our reserves. There has been a considerable increase in the demand for demonstrator and discretionary grants, and in the cost of distributing Revolutions. The end of covid restrictions has allowed the executive and members to meet in person with an increase in governance costs and meeting expenses. Against this there was an income from the seminar of some £7,000.

The charity has made a deficit of some £12,000 this year (£13,644 in 2021) which was broadly in line with the budget for the year. This leaves our reserves at £64,000. £20,000 is separated to cover winding down costs in the event of the charity failing and some £8,000 should be kept covering losses carried in the trading company. This leaves £36,000 free reserves.

The proposed increase in subscription together with increasing membership post covid and the associated gift aid should just about cover the current deficit but the proposed increase in the demonstrator grant will cost £3200, and the increased show activities could put us back into deficit, but at a much-reduced level.

On a brighter note, the association has recently been awarded a further £5,000 for the Nina and Roger Stewart fund which currently stands at £6,300.

# Yew and resin bowl

# **Harry Rodwell**

Hello, my name is Harry Rodwell and I am currently a 16 year old sixth form student. I completed this project independently at school using their Union Graduate lathe. This project started off as an idea to use resin with a live edge piece of wood. This was my first ever resin project and only my 6th or 7th bowl. It is made of Yew wood and clear resin, I added blue dye to this resin but obviously this was not enough as it appears very transparent. However I think I prefer this look as it complements the wood well.





1. I started off with gluing two pieces of Yew together with the edges facing each other. The idea behind this was to create almost a channel in which I could pour the resin and when turned would look very natural with as few straight lines as possible. After the glue had dried i sealed the sides with plywood and silicone and prepared to pour



2. I poured around 1 kg of resin into the wood, I needed much more than I thought. This was because the resin seeped into the depth of a knot in the wood. Resin usually takes a few days before it is fully hard and should be left longer before worked with. However I poured this piece on a Friday night and was turning by Monday. I think mainly because it was left in a warm room which helped the curing process.



- 3. The pour was mostly a success apart from the fact I had a leak. I think this was down to the knot in the wood leaking the thinner resin through, alongside a poor job of sealing the sides. Overall this wasn't too detrimental, as the resin got thicker it stopped leaking and I patched the suspected leak area with parcel tape during the pour.
- 4. After this had set I removed the square piece from my mould and cut the edges off using a bandsaw so It was easier to turn. At this point you can see the resin "window" formed on the side of the bowl and see how it may look when finished.
- 5. As I rounded the bowl I realised the difficulty of turning resin. It is surprisingly extremely hard when set, almost more so than wood. Which makes the process rather similar to



woodturning, however long strands of plastic mess are produced opposed to wood shavings. Along with this hardness comes brittleness and if you do not persist with soft passes then it can be easy to cause a catch. Which is much more obvious in resin. A small catch can be seen in this image near the top of the bowl.



6/7. Hollowing out the middle was easy at first as It was just the same as a normal wooden bowl. I wanted to make sure I made the walls thin enough so the resin could be seen from both sides.

8. As I got to the interior resin part the hollowing out suddenly got much more difficult. At this angle using a bowl gouge caused constant catches and I needed to use a combination of higher speed, sharper chisels and softer passes. Similar projects I have seen using resin online swear by carbide tip chisels for this work as catches are less prominent. However, for this bowl I only had traditional tools.



9. After I had the shape I liked it came to sanding - I must note that whenever you are sanding resin you must wear some kind of breathing ppe as the dust produced is very fine. I started off with an 80 grit and worked up to 1200 grit.



10/11. In these images the bowl is seen sanded up to 1200 grit however not finished. I wanted to get the resin as clear as possible and surprisingly 1200 grit more or less did the job however there was still an essence of cloudiness. So I finished it using a resin polishing compound then applied Danish Oil.

12/13. The finished product, finished at 1200 grit with polishing compound and Danish Oil. There are some imperfections, as seen in photo 12 there is a slight chip in the very bottom of the bowl however I was fearful of working it down more as I was very close to going through the bottom.







Overall I am very happy with this project and would like to pursue more resin and wood projects in the future. Although i'm happy with the bowl, there are a few things I would do differently:





- 1. If I were to do it again I would try and find a whole piece of wood instead of gluing two pieces together, even though the grains match up fairly well a line can still be seen through the center of the bowl
- 2.The bubbles- as seen in image 13 when observed closely you can see a lot of very small bubbles in the piece, This is a problem in all resin projects and usually alleviated with a heat gun which I used, however I believe air seeped through from the knot in the wood while setting and causes there to be bubbles. This could have been alleviated by either fully sealing the knot or using a small vacuum chamber.
- 3. I would maybe use carbide tip chisels for the next resin project mainly for turning the bowl portion, just so I could avoid as many catches as possible.
- 4. Due to the lack of cole jaws/vacuum chuck etc at my disposal I was not able to make the bottom of the bowl concave or get rid of the holding recess on the base. This is fine and is featured on all of my projects however I would have liked to remove this if I could have.



# Teaching success at Coombe Abbey Woodturners

A worthwhile breakthrough following COVID closures, Coombe Abbey Woodturners Club has successfully had five members who have earned AWGB creditation for teaching new members, this will help us to give more lessons in our workshop and hopefully encourage more people into the art of Woodturning.

A session was arranged with the AWGB for January 12th 2023 with Steve Gordon development officer and Dave Atkinson carrying out the examination. The session was held in our workshop at Coombe Abbey Country Park on the outskirts of Coventry, and commenced at 10 am, the first two were Phil Steele and Giles Headley, to begin with each member had to demonstrate their knowledge and how they would introduce new people to the art of Woodturning i.e. all about the lathe, the stance and the various parts of the machine and the tools that were to be used, then go through a lesson with a new applicant at the lathe. The next members were Pat Hanley and Lee Cartwright with two trainees Tony Nicholson and John Parkes again the results were very good and the assessors were quite happy, by this time it was lunchtime, once refreshment time was over it was time for the last member Don Kildin at the lathe, again everything went according to plan with Don being a little apprehensive but he coped very well and again satisfied the assessor Steve Gordon. Dave Atkinson had already left to go to another appointment. After the five members had finished their examinations Steve was quite happy, they all received their certificates. We as a club can now hopefully continue to grow with more new members joining after some successful lessons in our Coombe Abbey Workshop.

The pupil for Don's lesson was Michelle Standbridge who is the wife of one of our members, she also helps in the kitchen on the days we have demonstrations. Michelle seems to have taken naturally to woodturning and both husband and wife will be very good for our clubs future, along with the other pupils who we hope will attend events and demonstrations.

We wish our five club members many thanks for taking part in the training programme and hope they continue giving lessons to anyone wishing to learn the art of woodturning so carrying this art into the future.

# As Pontes Association of Friends of Wood

It gave me great pleasure to read in the March issue of Revolutions the most interesting article by Paul Hannaby on the As Pontes Association of Friends of Wood, the only overseas Club associated to the AWGB. Woodturning Clubs are rare in Spain and this is probably the most successful. Apart from their bi-weekly Club meetings and Exhibitions and Demonstrations in their area, they have the responsibility of organising the annual Encontro de Torneiros de Galicia (Woodturning Convention of Galicia), the only real woodturning event in the whole of Spain.

This annual Convention was started in 2001 in a rural workshop/Rural Tourism Hostel deep in the countryside of Galicia with probably only a few Woodturners attending. By 2005, my first visit, it had expanded to some 25/30 turners and had an exhibition in the nearby village of Xermade. At this time the quality of woodturning was good but fairly basic as they were slowly learning their skills and techniques. Within a few years the number of Woodturners had expanded to well over 100 and the Convention was moved completely to the Sports Hall in Xermade and has continued to expand exponentially with several hundred now exhibiting their pieces. Inspired initially by the late Fernando Perez, their local talented turner, and the numerous professional Demonstrators, the quality of workmanship and innovation is now of a high international standard.

The Convention is held over three days and there are usually four professional demonstrators, usually one British, two other internationals and one Spanish. Some years one is a blind Spanish turner. Every year Manuel Castro (Lolo) demonstrates his wizardry with their traditional hooktool of which he is a complete master.

Two suppliers attend, one of which is the main supplier of woodturning machinery, tools and equipment based in Mallorca (TornyFusta) and the other general woodworking supplies and timber (Comerciales Pazos).

There are several long trestle tables on which attendees can book space to exhibit and sell their pieces and the variety and craftsmanship is exemplary. On the last day, a group of Judges select some 50 pieces from the exhibitors, plus one piece donated by each demonstrator, to form that year's Itinerant Exhibition (Contornos) which is displayed at various venues around Spain and at the next Convention.

As this Convention is funded by the Provincial Government of Galicia there is no attendance fee. Entrance to all, Woodturners and public, is completely free, so there is no record of the numbers attending but it must pass some 300 to 400 over the 3 days. Each year there is a specially designed commemorative Tee-shirt on sale.

If any member is touring in the Galicia region of Spain they would be most warmly welcome to visit this friendly associated Club; look them up on the AWGB website. If they happen to be in the area in the third week of September (15th-17th for 2023) then a visit to the Convention would be a most interesting and rewarding experience. Excellent, friendly accommodation can be found at Casa Rural de

Artesania de a Fraga (casadafraga.com) which is where the Convention was first held. Some form of transport is preferable as this is rural Spain with no public transport.

Much information about these Conventions can be found simply by internet searching for "Encontro de Torneriros de Galicia" with many websites available.

A demonstration of the hook-tool (Llerga in Galicia) can be found by searching for "Manuel Castro Lolo Tornero".

# **Organic Shape and Oddments**

# **Malcolm Thorpe**

I have been turning for more years than I like to think about and have accumulated a large amount of timber. In an attempt to tidy-up, a number of items (1) turned up that would only make a shallow bowl. There were some interesting timbers and I started matching shapes and sizes of complementary woods to make a trinket box.



I have always been fascinated by the shape of the sea urchin (2), which is nature's way of equalising the tension in the fragile skeleton for the life under water. The shape has a continuously varying curve and it seemed logical to apply this shape to the oddly assorted timber I had found. I chose a piece of Salmon Gum burr (3) 130 mm dia. by 25mm thick and a piece of Elm 180mm dia. by 38 mm thick.







To make the box first mount the base on a screw chuck and clean up the outside diameter (4). Turn the front face flat (5). Glue a waste block 50mm dia by 50mm long to the base with a chucking point (6). This will save wasting timber and give space for turning the complete curve from base to top.






Next mount the top for the underside to be turned. The box will need a handle so drill a hole for a screw chuck. Use a larger drill than normal and put a small chamfer on the top, this will stop the screw chuck damaging the surface of the blank. Use a spacer to keep a minimum of thread in the work piece. Face off the blank and clean up the diameter. Turn a register 4mm deep and 8 to 10 mm wide ensuring the face is flat and the register at 90 degrees (7). Next contour the inside using the cross section diagram as a guide. Aim for a thickness of 6-8 mm, with a central boss 10-12 mm thick and 20mm wide. Take care around the screw chuck thread. Sand and polish the inside. (8).







Next mount the base in the scroll chuck and clean up the face flat. Partially scoop out the inside and make a jam chuck (9) for the top/lid. Do not make the fit too tight as the top will need to be removed to check the wall thickness. Use the tailstock for support during the bulk of the turning. I do not believe in wasting timber so each piece is unique, based on the original proportions of thicknesses and diameters. Cut a register for the foot 2mm deep roughly the diameter of the top, this will give a firm base and the eye will follow the curve giving the piece a lift.





Turn the corner into a smooth curve up to about half the thickness of the base and continue with the upper curve. The sea urchin shape calls for a parabolic continuously varying radius (see cross section). This needs good hand-eye coordination while steadily removing the unwanted wood (11). Do not take too much off the joint face as there is only about a millimetre spare. This can be checked by gently removing the top using the screw chuck thread. When getting close, check how the curve is forming by using a long glue stick bent around the curve to indicate the high points (10). Subtle undulations can be felt with the fingertips, remove them by shear scraping or with a square scraper. When happy with the shape sand down to 400 grit abrasive, seal and polish (12).





Remove the lid and finish opening out the base. The undercut is quite severe and I found the carbide ring cutter the easiest tool to use. Unlike a normal bowl the base is flat so the same care that was taken over the smooth curve should be applied to getting the base flat. Sand and polish the inside, taking care of the joint face (13).

The lid has a sharp edge, so mount the lid on a scrap piece in the chuck, profiled to suit the top. Secure with a central





screw. Give the edge a light sanding for safe handling (14). Remount the base and lightly sand the joint register to give the lid a free fit, so that the box can be accessed one-handed. The outer edge of the joint on the base needs a little extra sanding, taking the sharp edge away to match the top. Seal and add a coat of wax polish.

Reverse mount the base on a jam chuck, with the support of the tailstock, remove the scrap chucking point. I use a thin parting tool close to the work, cutting to about 12mm dia and finally cutting off with a saw. Bring up the tailstock and profile the base (15). Sand and polish (16)

All that is left is a handle. If it is going on display then a slender finely turned finial would suit, but I think they are too fragile and pointed for practical use. The shape can range from a simple sphere to a short finial.

# ToolPost Versachuck

# Without doubt the most versatile wood lathe chuck on the planet



The Versachuck is modular and can fit almost all wood lathes out there. But whereas all other chucks limit you to jaws from just that one make, the Versachuck accepts jaws from almost all mainstream manufacturers, including of course, our own.

The material should be selected to give a highly polished finish with a good feel, mostly found in exotics such as Rosewood, Bloodwood, Ebony or Partridgewood as above samples. More exotic could be artificial ivory, Tagua palmnut or Betel nut.

I decided to try a Betel nut, available from oriental shops known as Supari. Make a carrier from a hardwood such as African Blackwood, about 22mm dia. Turn a register to suit the hole in the lid, which is drilled 4mm by 8mm deep (21). Partially part off the carrier making a 4 mm dia spigot for a pip to fit in the underside of the lid. Cut off the carrier and the pip with a saw (22).





Betel nuts often have a random fissure in the centre and variable colour. To prepare: turn a cove into a scrap piece in the chuck and using hot melt glue fix the dome end of the nut in the cove. Face off the nut, clean up the outside, and drill the base 7mm x 7mm deep (23). If there are no bad cracks and a good colour, remove from the cove.





Mount the carrier in an ER25 collet and prepare a spigot for the Betel nut (24). Glue in place with epoxy adhesive (25). The epoxy helps to stabilise the centre of the nut. Shape the handle: Betel nuts need small cuts using sharp tools. The nut does not sand well so it is better to polish with a cutting wax (26).





Turn the button for the underside of the lid (27) and glue the handle and button in place (28).





Photo 29 shows a selection of boxes that worked well as trinket boxes. They can be opened with one hand but also feel nice if handled. The lids have been made with highly figured timbers that catch the eye.





# Lincolnshire Wolds Woodturning Association



On 10-11 Mar 2023 at the Midlands Woodworking Show, the Lincolnshire Wolds Woodturning Association exhibited over 110 items of members work along with a woodturning, pyrography and airbrushing demonstrations to the large crowds visiting the show. On the final day, they were thrilled that Emma 'The Tiny Turner' who has previously demonstrated for the Club on several occasions not only in the Village Hall at West Ashby, but also online via Zoom, was able to spare some time to carry out a very important task.

Each year, the Club's Honorary President, Mr Vic Atkinson nominates a worthy winner of the Presidents Trophy. This is awarded to a member who has provided outstanding support and service to the Club. Emma was asked if she would present the Trophy this year to the 2022 winner, Mr John Liles.

John, who turns 88 this year, is one of the Club's oldest members. He is also the longest serving and one of the founder members of the Club. Back in 1951 at 16 yrs old he left school on the Friday and started his first job woodworking on the Monday at Messers Ogles, Hardwood sawmill, Victoria St, Grimsby. A couple of his first turning jobs were making the rungs for builder's ladders and 2ft 6" net poles used by the ladies to make fishing nets. After leaving the sawmill, John worked on the fish docks, at Grimsby making wooden fish boxes for double the money he had been getting at Ogles. He then moved on to working in a chemical factory and finally, retiring at 62.

He had a craft unit at Waltham Mill near Grimsby where he continued woodturning for several years. He offered to help the Miller to enable him to go away for weekends, but before he knew it, the Miller had left and John was left holding the flour bag and instantly promoted to become the new Miller and had a very steep learning curve. After doing the job for a further 15 years, he finally retired again and handed it over to four new willing volunteers.

John was previously a member of the Louth Woodturning Club which unfortunately folded and he came along to Club in its early years, where, ever since he has been doing numerous demonstrations for the members in the Village Hall, at other Club events, national shows, training days and hands on nights. He never stops amazing the members with his expertise with spindle work and is affectionally known as the skew master. The Club often gets asked to help with making various items for the public and any spindle work, John is without doubt, the first person that is recommended to help.

One such job was the making of two replica ack-ack shells for the Lincolnshire Aviation Heritage Centre at East Kirkby, near Spilsby, Lincs, home of one of the three surviving Lancaster bombers. John with his vast skills and a lathe that could take on the task, soon produced the two 1 metre long and 90mm diameter shells which were presented to the Museum who were thrilled with their new exhibit.

Since Covid, the Lincolnshire Wolds Woodturning Association now meet three times a month. Due to two of those



meetings taking place on Zoom, its does not matter where you live and as a result they are attracting new members from anywhere in the world. On the 2nd Tuesday of the month, members and guests are able to have a go on a lathe with help being given by skilled experienced turners. Then on the third Tuesday an online Workshop Night has turners set up in their workshops using Zoom breakout rooms and the camera system kindly provided by the AWGB. On the last Tuesday of the month, a professional demonstrator from around the world provides a live online interactive demonstration via Zoom providing new ideas and techniques.
